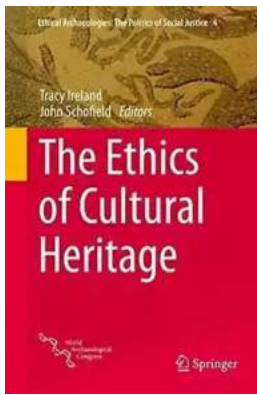

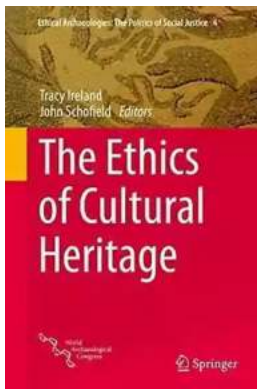

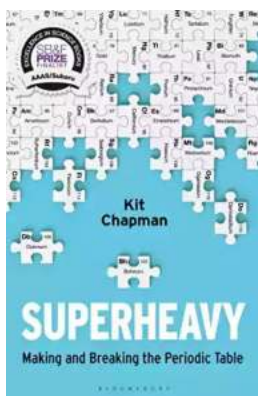
proliferate about what constitutes appropriate professional ethics within these related and relevant contexts.
