



Tin-foil hat time, Seine?

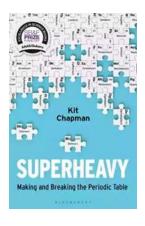
