

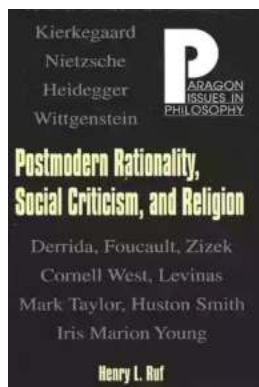

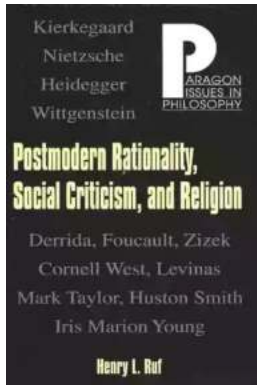

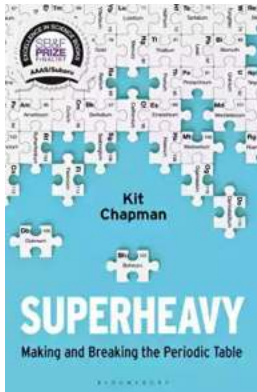
The text aims at aiding readers to see that neither pursuing knowledge and justice nor remaining religiously faithful need a/social and a/historical ultimates.
